



The women were all given silver bird necklaces to go along with our theme, "His Eye is on the Sparrow, and I Know He Watches Me." The tables and meeting room were decorated beautifully with birdcages, birds, and autumn leaves. The weekend began on Friday evening with a fun Mixer led by Kathleen Modders. As always, she put a lot of time and effort into the activities. We all learned something new about people from the Scriptures and each other. and had a lot of laughs. Saturday started out with Lynnette Daniels bringing the morning Devotions. She shared a personal testimony how God was with her (and still is!) during a very difficult, challenging time. At this year's Praise Gathering Kelli Williams, Denise Rich, Amanda Ruch, and Mary June Garn shared hymns that were special to them. Mike grilled the burgers, hot dogs and brats on the grill and members from the congregation brought a dish to pass to compliment the burgers and hot dogs. Everyone had a nice time fellowshipping one with another.

8/23/19 Mission Trip to Wisconsin from Jay Havener. On August 23, 2019 I met Brother Brian Mundy at the St. Paul/Minneapolis airport and we traveled to Eau Claire, Wisconsin and on to Barron and Chetek. Wisconsin. We went to meet with a group of Saints that have had no priesthood or communion for six years. In Eau Claire, we had a wonderful visit with Elder Bernard and Sister Marge Holler. It was through "Bernie" that this trip came about. The Hollers get Oakwood's DVDs and have worshiped with Oakwood for several years through Oakwood's DVD ministry. The Hollers have not been able to travel due to health issues and brother Bernie's ability to minister has been very limited because of it. Bernie and I have spoken many times over the phone and it was one such conversation that led to the discovery of a group of Saints in Barron and Chetek that have no priesthood in their area for several years. They too, receive Oakwood's DVDs and have met as an informal group from time to time to study and worship via those DVDs. For several weeks, the Lord laid it heavily on my heart that some priesthood needed to get up there to bring ministry to those dear Saints. I kept asking the Lord, who should go. His answer was that I needed to go. I spoke with Brother Brian Mundy about the need in Wisconsin and we quickly made plans to travel together to Wisconsin. When we pulled up into the driveway of Sister Sue Allen's home, her and

her mother Jeanette Lampien were outside and when I got out of the car. Sister Lampien pointed her finger at me and said, "I know who you are! You are Brother Jay. I have seen you many times on the DVDs!" At once, it felt like we had known one another for a long time. Sister Allen and her husband were gracious hosts and we spent time sharing in particular with Sister Allen and talking about how the Saints had managed to stay so true, without priesthood and regular church services. We also shared with her husband who is a nonmember but supports his wife's beliefs in every way that he can. He truly has a servant's heart. Saturday, we spent time with extended family and visited Brother Bill, a Navy veteran, in the local nursing home. Brother Bill was 96, an Elder in the church (and sadly has since gone to his reward), and although he had Alzheimer's, he could recall his days in the Navy doing his duty on a submarine during WWII. We administered to him. Brother Bill kept his scriptures wellguarded in the seat of his walker. His son Tom opened the seat to show us and Brother Bill told him, "Put those back! They are mine and no one is going to take them from me!" Later that evening, we visited with family at the home of Jeanette Lampien. Her husband was the last able-bodied priesthood that served the group before his passing several years earlier. We learned how the Saints in Wisconsin sang happy birthday (Jeanette who has heard our branch sing it on the DVDs from time to time, said we have been singing it all wrong) as her niece was having a birthday. They add the phrase "The Lord bless and keep you, happy birthday to you." Sunday morning, we held church service in the basement of the Allen home. There were about 20 in attendance. It was

the first time in six years that they had been able to partake of communion. What an experience for me! I will never take the sacrament for granted again. As I watched as they partook of the bread, most of them had tears in their eyes as they ate of the bread. There was such a sweet spirit there. Brother Bryan brought the message of the hour as I presided. Then afterwards, Brother Brian and I shared in a class setting with them and shared testimonies. It was a wonderful weekend of fellowship and there is such a core of Saints in the area. Brother Brian and I talked about how Wisconsin was the seed-bed of the Reorganization and we feel that Wisconsin can once again can be important to the Restoration because of the dedication of the Saints. At one time there were many RLDS churches throughout the state of Wisconsin. We both believe there are many yet in Wisconsin that have a great heritage in the Church but have forgotten it.

# God Slowed Time (A Testimony of Jay Havener)

In latter August of this year, Elder Brian Mundy and I went to Wisconsin to minister to a group of Saints who have been without priesthood for several years. As we were making our way back to the Minneapolis/St. Paul airport, we stopped in Eau Claire to minister to Elder Bernard and Sister Marge Holler. As often happens when visiting the Saints, time slipped by faster than we had anticipated and it was a rush to get to the airport in time for our flights. My flight was to leave at 5 p.m. and Brian's was a bit later. Eau Claire is about 2 hours from Minneapolis and Brother Brian dropped me off at the front of the departure terminal at 4:00 p.m. and I still had to check my bag! By the time I checked my bag, it was 4:15 and boarding was to start at 4:30! I still had to make it through security. I have never seen a security line so long in all my travels! As I stood in line knowing I was on the last flight of the day back to Michigan, I started thinking that I had to call Kathi and let her know that I would not be making it home that evening. I had only moved about 10 feet in as many minutes! I bowed my head and prayed to my Heavenly Father. I prayed, "Lord, I really do want to make this flight, but I realize that the only way that I can is for you to slow time down. Would you Father, slow down time that I would make my flight home? I truly believe you are able to do so and you have blessed us so much on this mission trip already. So, I understand if you have another way or for some reason do not want me to make my flight, but I am ready to go home." It was already 4:25 p.m. Five minutes to when they would start boarding my flight home. I stayed in line and never once looked at the clock again. The line was not moving any faster than it had before. I cleared security and crossed two concourses to get to my gate. I was pretty sure it was a futile effort. When I got to my gate, they just called the first passengers to board the plane. I took out my cell phone and looked at the time. It was 4:30! There was no way! The last time I looked at my clock, it was 4:25 and I was very far back in the security line. The only explanation was that God had fulfilled my request and slowed down time! What an awesome and excellent God we have!

We would like to send our condolences to the family of Beverly R. Rowe. She was born, July 14, 1943 to the late John and Fern Gardner. She is survived by her husband, David Rowe of Clyde Township, son and daughter-in-law, Troy and Dr. Jeannie Rowe of Avoca, daughter, Loraine Reynolds of Texas, son and daughter-in-law, Jason and Inice Rowe of Virginia, two grandchildren, Alexandria Hollenbeck and Jade Rowe. Beverly was preceded in death by her son, Harry David Rowe. Funeral Services were held at 11:00 am Saturday, August 10, 2019 in the Jowett Funeral Home, 1634 Lapeer Avenue, Port Huron, Mi. Reverend Max Amstutz will officiate. Burial to take place in Kinney Cemetery.

Bernard Pearl gave me 63 years of his life history, starting with his military career on July 13, 1956. He had passed the physical in Detroit, and onto Fort Leonard Wood, Mo. for more tests and basic training was at Fort Hood, Texas. In October 18, 1956, he had traveled to Fort Dix, New Jersey for advance infantry training to go to Korea. He then had choice assignments and he chose Europe. He then boarded a ship, USS Geiger in New York for Germany. He was able to have his wife, Janice and daughter, Tina who flew the following year to Germany. There is more of his life's adventures in a U. S. Army Military book in the Library of Congress. Bernard has had many exciting and mysterious ventures and with God's protection through his many travels.

Deacon Andrew Scott Bolt preached on August 18 and Bruce Reid sang, "Daystar (Shine Down on Me)" by Bill Gaither and "Mansion Over the Hilltop" by Elvis Presley. They both did a fine job.

On August 23, 2019 our Branch was presented a Certificate of Appreciation for recognition of our generosity to the Lakota children. Last year the Younger Youth, and other branches, saved their money and donated to the Lakota children of St. Joseph's Indian School in Chamberlain, South Dakota. This year the Younger Youth are saving their money for the, "Light a House" project for the African Restoration Ministries. The light is 150 lumen output from 10 bright white LED lights. These lights charge in 14 hours in direct sunlight or 2-3 hours via USB and last up to 50 hours (USB cord included). The African children usually have kerosene lamps in their homes. The smell and the light have caused some of the people health issues. Kerosene is expensive costing \$1.12 per liter (\$4.24 per gallon) at the current rate and price. This is very expensive for the many poor families. These Solar Lanterns that our Younger Youth are saving for are giving more of cleanliness, brightness and safety to the children and families over in Africa. The cost of one of the solar lanterns is \$13.50 each. Our Michigan, Ohio, and Ontario children and their families have collected \$270.00 which is enough for 20 solar LED Lights. Elder Brian Mundy, from Missouri, receives the money and takes the solar lanterns to Africa. It is a worthwhile project for us all to get involved in helping others who are less fortunate, and it also helps the children to do their school homework.

We want to send Chase (Skip) and wife, Michelle (Shelly) Miller and the family of Skip's sister, Shirley (Miller) Ryan condolences of her passing on August 31, 2019. She is survived by her husband, Guy F. Ryan, Sr., her children, William and Jody Ryan and Patty Ryan (John Teichow), her grandchildren, Amber, Daniel, William, Tyler, Alison,

Nolan, Nathan, Jacob and Justin, her two brothers, Skip and Bill Miller, her pet, Thunder.

Memorials were made to the American Cancer Society. She was predeceased by her parents, William and Marion Miller; her son Guy F. Ryan, Jr. A memorial service was held on Saturday, September 7th, 2019 at 10:00 am at the Restored Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints. 1404 Garfield St., Port Huron, Mi. Elder John DeBell will officiate.

On August 31, 2019, Andrew Kercher, Port Huron Museum Manager of Community Engagements, wore gloves while handling John Riley's New Testament at the Port Huron Museum on Thursday. Andrew revealed what was faded but clearly etched inside: "John Riley. Indian Chief. His Book." John Riley, had settled in present-day St. Clair County with a store and trading post that he lived in year-round. His fence and gardens reached to 6 th. St. and south to Pine Street. Riley's father was an American trader and his mother a Chippewa, and he went on to become the leader of the Black River Band of her tribe in the early 1800's. John Riley's father, General James Van Slyke Riley, had signed the Treaty of Saginaw in 1816 with General Lewis Cass and they mention him, especially John Riley, because his father had three kids. John had two brothers, James and Peter Riley and they're divvying up huge portions of the Thumb area. John" was a pretty big deal in the early part of the 19th century." Riley Township was named for John Riley in 1841. Since this was written in the Port Huron Times. Bernard Pearl sent me a little over three pages of information on John Riley and I in turn sent this on to Chris Kercher or Andrew Kercher for further information for the Museum. John Rilev's Indian name was Black Cloud. John Riley died at Muncietown, Ontario in 1842. H. P. Chase gave his burial eulogy. One other

source, cites Courtland, New York as his burial place.

We would like to send condolences to the family of Robert E. Galeski, of Port Huron, who passed away on September 3, 2019.
